### CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Curricular aspects are the foundation of all Higher Education Institutions. The college has gradually expanded its domain by introducing PG courses, Career-Oriented Courses, relevant Diploma courses etc over the last few years. The college has successfully implemented the semester system, internal evaluation, online feeding of marks etc. and all UG/PG courses are running under Semester System as stipulated by WBSU. While revision and upgradation of the syllabi is done at the University level, the college has a mechanism for effective, documented curriculum delivery. The college plays vital role in curriculum designing as faculty members of some departments are members of Board of Studies actively engaged in syllabus revision, curriculum updating etc. All students start their journey with SNCW by undergoing an Orientation Programme, held on the first day of commencement of class, which paved the students' path to start their three year journey full of knowledge and enthusiasm. Timetable is prepared strictly in accordance with the guidelines of the University Curriculum and faculty load is maintained as per the University credits. At the commencement of each academic year, every faculty member provides the students with individual time plans and reading lists for each course which are displayed in the classrooms. Besides traditional lectures and seminars, infrastructure for the use of ICT in classrooms, like power point presentations, smart boards and audio-visual support are all available to make the delivery of the curriculum enabling and interesting for the students. Tutorials are held with mentoring and internal assessment is done transparently. The institution collects feedback from the students at the end

of every semester. Special attention is given to weak students especially belonging to SC/ST, OBC (non-creamy layer) and minorities through formal and informal Remedial Class taken from time to time. Special classes are arranged during vacation or off hours to compensate for the time lost in examination/evaluation. For overall quality enhancement, teachers are motivated to participate in seminar, workshop, conferences, refresher and orientation course etc. A rich central library with open access system is available along with departmental library facility.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
<p>The feedback from different stakeholders were collected separately. Students feedback was collected through online and the questionnaire was separate. Online feedback was analysed real-time and also through outside agency. The academic aspects were discussed in the departmental meetings and some recommendations were submitted to the Academic Sub-committee and to the college authority. Feed back from parents were collected through online and in the departmental Parent-Teacher meetings and their opinions regarding syllabus,</p>

teaching, fees structure etc were communicated to the Concerned Authority . As per parents suggestion monthly fees of the students have been slashed upto 50. Suggestions from parents about syllabus communicated to the corresponding BOS of the University through the Principal. Teachers feed back were analysed and discussed in the Teachers Council meetings and communicated to the college authority. The employers feed back were also collected and discussed in the Teachers Council and submitted to college authority for necessary action.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The institution has students mentoring system which is inter departmental in 2019-2020. At the beginning of the session meetings were held between the departments to assign which department will mentor the students of another department. Accordingly, honours students are grouped and assigned to teachers of another department year wise. As the students taking GE course belong to some honours departments, they are assigned as mentees to teachers from other departments as well. The mentors usually assign a particular day within a stipulated period to visit their mentees with prior intimation. They are assigned a schedule time when, the mentees and mentors have elaborate discussions about the mentees' problem. Each mentee is given separate time for discussion. Teachers patiently hear to the problems faced by the mentees. The problems are varied in nature like academic, financial, psychological, health issues etc. Academic problems are attempted to be solved by mentor by listing the difficult topics according to mentees and informing the subject teachers about the topics, encouraging them to do library work. Mentors also list the books the students don't have. The list of books is sent to the department so that the department may purchased the books through college library. Our mentors also provide advice, suggestion and motivation to mentees who witnessed family problems or psychological problem. In case of psychological problem, the mentees are advised to seek psychological counselling from the faculties of the department of Psychology. The mentees suffering from various health problems are advised by mentors to seek help from College Health committee and also motivated to maintain hygiene within the campus. Academically brighter students are encouraged to browse e-resource and strengthen their referencing system while preparing a topic. However, all students are motivated to become empowered by employment with the help of Placement Cell. Finally, we believe "mentoring is a brain to pick, an ear to listen and a push in right direction.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Our college is affiliated to the West Bengal State University and follows the evaluation scheme designed by the University. During the Lockdown following Covid-19 Pandemic, Online Assignments were taken from the students. It is worth reporting that despite the several problems that some of the students faced with regard to WiFi or internet connection or not having Laptops, the submission of assignments was almost cent percent. The college adheres to the factor of student attendance in all assessments, which serves as an incentive for regularity and academic discipline. The specific methods of assessment varies from subject to subject according to the recommendations of the respective board of studies of the affiliating University but the methods include performances in regular assignments, class tests, seminar presentations, projects, viva etc. There is an online platform available for students where multiple choice tests are conducted module wise. The performance of the students are closely monitored by the departmental teachers and the marks awarded in continuous internal evaluation (assessment) are being shown on the marks transcript, along with the candidate's performance in end-semester examination to determine the grade and grade point in each respective course (paper).

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The CBCS system was introduced by the University from 2018-19 session. The State Government and the university declared the dates of commencement of the sessions and the date of commencement of the semester examinations. The college uploaded those information to the college website and prepared own academic calendar. Academic calendar for 2019-20 was prepared in two portions odd and even semester, the Odd Semester commencing in the month of July and the even semester commencing in the month of January. However, from March 16, 2020 the

college was closed by the order of the state Government and regular Academic Calendar was disrupted.

<p>The college actively engages both internal and outsourced resources for the maintenance of its infrastructure. There are twelve departments with one or more laboratories and one research laboratory for science teachers. The cleaning and maintenance of these laboratories are mostly outsourced. Several AMCs have been signed with various vendors with regards to this. Pest Control in the central library is done annually by an external agency. KOHA, the library management software, is maintained on a regular contractual basis. Physical maintenance of the books is done by the college staff. Cleaning of the play fields is done by external agency. Time to time renovation of the fields is mostly done by PWD. Regular AMCs are done for maintenance of LAN facilities, CCTV, Computers in the departments, laboratories, library, office and elsewhere. High Speed Internet facility is provided and maintained by BSNL. Software, including the Student and Staff Management Systems are under regular AMC. Cleaning of classrooms and offices is outsourced. The electrician of the college maintains the electric connections. ACs, Generator, Water Purifiers and Fire Extinguishers are maintained by external agencies. After March 20, regular maintenance of the infra structure is somewhat hindered as the college was closed by order of the State Govt. Again, the internet connections have been disrupted by the cyclone Amphan though efforts have been made to restore those as per as practicable. After March 20, regular sanitation of the college campus has been undertaken.</p>

The management of the college is primarily bestowed upon the Governing Body (GB) and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Both the bodies function



in a democratic and participatory manner. The GB constitutes of the Principal, Representatives from the Government and University and elected representatives from Teaching, Non-Teaching staff members, and students of the college. The Principal is the de-facto Member-Secretary, and the President is also elected by the GB members. The GB mainly looks after the governance of the college and its jurisdiction runs over both academic and financial matters of the college.

For this it is helped by two committees - The Academic Committee and the Finance committee. The Academic Committee constitutes of teaching members from various departments, representatives from IQAC and non-teaching staff members.

It mainly looks after the academic environment and academic calendar of the college. The Finance Committee constitutes of teaching and non-teaching members from the Governing Body. It looks at the budget and other finance-related matters of the college. The GB proposes, discusses and decides upon issues in a congenial and democratic atmosphere. The IQAC comprises of the Principal, representatives from teaching staff members nominated by the Teachers' Council (TC), non-teaching staff members, student representative(s), alumni and experts in various fields. The main purpose of IQAC is to look after the quality parameters regarding academic, infrastructural including IT-related matters. It encourages the teachers to adopt student-friendly ways of teaching and evaluation, to excel in academics and proposes measures by which the infrastructure, environment, and administration of the college may be furthered. The IQAC takes regular feedback from all stakeholders and thereby plays a positive role in enhancing the academic atmosphere of the college.

The cell in co-ordination with the IQAC hosts a number of programmes to keep students abreast with job trends and offers. Students get placed in various sectors ranging from BPS to Healthcare every year.
Research and Development	An exclusive Research and Ethics Committee has been established to promote research environment in the campus by monitoring the research profile of faculty members of each and every department. The IQAC through the Research Committee of the college sensitize the faculty members to obtain research grants and publish research findings in peer reviewed and high impact factor journals. During this session, faculties from the Arts and Humanities section (Departments of Bengali, Geography, History, Philosophy) and faculties from the

Science section (Departments of Zoology and Food Nutrition) were granted seed money ranging between Rs. 10,000-35,000/- for carrying out minor projects involving students after careful consideration of their research proposals by the RE cell of the college. **Admission of Students:** The students in the college are admitted through an online portal. The details regarding admission procedure are published in the college website immediately after the publication of Class XII results. The students are required to register and apply online and fill the requisite fields. The payment is also made through various payment gateways, both online and offline. If their name appears in the merit list they are required to upload the requisite documents on the website and take admission by making the requisite payment. Percentage of power requirement of the University met by the renewable energy sources
<p>Keeping in mind the main target of National Energy Policy (2006) of India, our college is presently using solar panels in order to minimize overconsumption of fossil fuel/ non renewable resources. The solar panels have been installed on the roof of the new building of our college. We have already reduced huge amount of Carbon dioxide emission by replacing incandescent lamps with LED bulbs from previous year and it continues till date. The energy consumption of 443 incandescent lamps for 1 year (~300 days open) at a rate of 5 hrs per day is 39,900 KW which is 39,900 unit. Energy consumed by 100 LED bulbs for 1 year at the rate of 5 hrs per day is 3000 kW which is 3000 units. So, introducing LED bulb by replacing incandescent lamps, we have saved (39,900- 3000) 36900 unit of power consumption per year. As 0.538 kg coal is required to produce 1 unit of electricity. Hence for 36,900 units 19852.2 kg coal is required. 1 kg coal emits 2.86 kg of Carbon dioxide. Therefore, 19852.2 kg coal emits 56777.3 kg Carbon dioxide. B) Installation of Solar Panel 3000 KW solar panel is installed which produce an average (3.5x3) 10.5 unit power per day. So this small unit is producing an average of 3832 unit power per year without use of non-renewable energy source like coal etc and saving our environment from Carbon dioxide emission by 10961 kg during production of thermal power.</p>

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#### 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

- Green Auditing for waste management, water management and energy management and evaluation of carbon footprint has been conducted during 2019-2020 session.
- Vermicomposting Vermicomposting process is performed in the college campus to minimize the generation of solid waste. Fruit and vegetable wastes generated from Department of Food and Nutrition, canteen kitchen and Hostel are used as raw materials. In this context a vermicompost pit has been constructed in the college campus and composting is performed in a regular basis.
- Eco Club Formation The main aim of the college is to maintain the natural environment and cleanliness in and around the college campus and to declare the college campus as a plastic free green zone. To fulfil these objectives, Eco Club has been formed to educate students to create awareness on environmental protection to maintain the campus clean and green.
- Installation of solar panel Keeping in mind the main target of National Energy Policy (2006) of India, our college is presently using four solar panels in order to minimize overconsumption of fossil fuel/ non renewable resources. The solar panels have been installed on the roof of the new building of our college.
- Plantation by reusing plastic bottles Every year tree plantation programme is organized by the College Authority in which every First Year Undergraduate

Students participate with complete enthusiasm. The concept of plantation has been combined with the reuse of plastic bottles. The used up plastic bottles can be reused as planters in a creative way. All these students use a plenty of innovative ways to decorate planters and grow plants. The plastic bottles are partially filled up with soil after cutting into different shapes and plantation is done by them. With the help of these plants, vertical gardens are made in the college campus every year during winter season.

• Seminar A seminar was conducted on June 25, 2019 for the better management of the college campus and management of solid waste generated. Dr. Susanta Poddar (Head, ESH, Pepsico) was invited as a resource person. He supervised the ongoing Green Audit programme of the college campus and contributed his valuable suggestions and opinions to the Green Audit team. Interruption of the Green audit programme during Lockdown due to COVID 19 pandemic (March 21, 2020 to May, 2020) and Amphan The continuous monitoring of the college campus as a part of green audit was interrupted for a considerable time period during lockdown. Moreover, the devastating cyclone AMPHAN (date of occurrence: May 20, 2020) caused extensive damage in the college campus. Maximum trees were ripped from the ground that significantly reduced the green cover of the college campus. Majority of the solar panels was also destroyed during amphan.

## 7.2 – Best Practices

### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice I 1. Title of the Practice: Journey towards Women Empowerment 2. Goal: Sarojini Naidu College for Women is situated in a semi urban area where a major section of the students come from a financially weaker section. During studies they face some financial difficulties which are addressed by the college. However, once, they pass out from the college, they face the real world which challenges them in every step of their life. 3. Context: In order to help these students to be eligible to face the world, the college has taken several steps. Students of the college are encouraged to undertake various certificate and diploma courses, so that they may become physically strong and their confidence to take on life is also boosted. 4. The Practice: The College initiated following diploma and certificate courses: • Self Defence: The students are encouraged to learn to defend themselves and other women from predators by taking up diploma and certificate courses in (i) Judo and Self-defence, (ii) Karate and self-defence and (iii) Myuithai and self-defence. Moreover, by learning these techniques, they are empowered to be able to be employed in various security agencies, Police Force, Military etc. • Computer Training: Students of the college are encouraged to be computer proficient by enrolling in several certificate courses offered by the Sarojini Naidu College Computer Centre run by the college in collaboration with Indian Institute of Engineers. • Physiotherapy: The certificate course in Physiotherapy is undertaken by the college in collaboration with Shivananda Health Society. Women up to thirty years of age are eligible to undertake this course. They are trained in a way, so that they can be self-dependent. • NCC Training: This training brings about discipline and a sense of companionship among the students. This training also help them avail job opportunities in Police force and army. • Training in Games: Training program in games like KHO KHO, Kabaddi, Badminton, Yoga etc. were also organised by the college. • Drama Work Shop: Both Bengali and English PG students have taken part in workshops organized by the concerned departments. 5. Evidence of Success: In 2019-20 a few hundred students have taken up these courses. There have been some other value added course which gave them training in life skill. Two of our students have been selected for taking part in the Republic Day March Past in Delhi. Our college has organized the inter-college Yoga competition as part of the inter-college tournament organized by the West Bengal State University and won the Runners Up prize in Kabaddi. Students of Bengali Department have won the first prize in

Inter-college Drama Competition organized by the Drama Club, Vivekananda College for their portrayal of drama "Aranyok". Three students of our college participated in Recitation Competition organized by Alipore Zoo on the occasion of Zoo Festival and one student was enlisted for special mention.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: These extra -curricular activities need considerable time from the students and financial resources from the institution. Under CBCS system, classes are held on time bound basis and internal examinations for each paper is held within this limited period. Therefore, continuing the training classes is being very difficult for the students as well as the faculty members supervising these trainings due to their heavy class load. However, the training classes are held in such a way that they do not hinder regular classes of the curriculum. Holding workshops for the PG students also have some financial involvement.

Best Practice 2

1. Title of the Practice: Creating Social Awareness among the Students
2. Goal: In its focus on the all -round development of the students, the College adopts a need- based approach, that will deliver a comprehensive and balanced education. The aim of this practice is to create consciousness among students about their role in society as agents of social change.
3. Context: Sarojini Naidu College for Women is a Government Sponsored institution. Which means that most of the expenditure for running of the institution comes from the Government exchequer, namely, from the taxes of the people. Thus, it is the duty of all the members of the college community to give back something to the society.
4. The Practice: With the above mentioned focus, the college has undertaken some programs:
  - To commemorate birth anniversaries of the visionaries of our country such as Pandit Iswarchandra Vidyasagar, Swami Vivekananda, Rabindranath Tagore, B.R. Ambedkar and Sm Sarojini Naidu in whose name the college is established. Students are encouraged to go through their writings and spread their messages to others. All of these leaders of our country have dedicated their lives for our country, by observing their birth days, students are inspired to do something for others.
  - National and International days are observed, such as Independence Day, Republic Day, International Mother Language Day, International Women's Day etc. These programs are organised in such a way that students become aware about the rich cultural heritage of our country and to spread the sense of patriotism and secularism among them. International mother language Day is observed so that the students become aware of the diversity of our motherland with a rich cultural heritage. International Women's Day is observed so that the students, who are women themselves become aware of Women's rights and equality. Hiroshima Day is observed online to make the students aware of the massacre of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and to encourage them to lend their voice for world peace.
  - World Environment Day is observed on 5th June through a webinar organized by the Department of Zoology. Students are encouraged to take part in improving the Green environment of their locality. Again, saplings are planted within the college campus during "Aranya Saptaha" i.e. July 14th to 21st, 2019, to make the campus more green.
  - NSS volunteers have taken part in COVID'19 awareness program, as well as helping under privileged children, awareness program on plastic management etc.
5. Evidence of Success: Each year, more and more students participate in the programs and some of them perform in cultural program, whereas some discuss about the significance of the occasion. Some of the students created posters and published them on line, so that even students from other colleges may be encouraged to be socially responsible. The students planted saplings in their homes and sent pictures of those.
6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: In the CBCS system of teaching-learning, the number of weeks for effective teaching are limited with internal examinations in between. Moreover, due to the closure of the college from mid-March, the trainings in physical mode was halted. However, the trainers shifted to online mode. Again it is difficult for such activities which require physical proximity, like the self-defence courses could not be continued properly. Again, each activity involves

some financial commitment which is borne by the college.

### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

Sarojini Naidu College for Women has been established on 14th August, 1956 by the initiative of the then Chief Minister of West Bengal Dr. Bidhan Chandra Roy, to rehabilitate the women refugees of erstwhile East Pakistan. Keeping the tradition of distinctiveness, the college has been taking initiative to bring more and more no of girls under the aegis of higher education and consistently diversifying the teaching-learning process. Not only that, the IQAC has encouraged all the members of the college to participate in various activities for social awareness and welfare programs. The college revealed its concern for society at large during the COVID'19 situation as also the time of natural calamity. On behalf of Sarojini Naidu College for Women, relief was provided to the people affected by the Super-Cyclone Amphan in the Rupmari Gram-Panchayat area of Hingalgang in the district of North 24 Parganas. On 6th June, 2020, Dr Krishnapada Das and Professor Prantik Hansda of the Department Of Mathematics and Professor Azizul Biswas of the Department of History went to the cyclone-affected areas to distribute relief to 320 families of the Rupmari Gram-Panchayat. Two masks were distributed to each family to increase awareness about the necessity of adequate protection during the pandemic. Students also participated in preparation of the relief materials. Teaching members of the college donated one day's salary to the West Bengal State Emergency Relief Fund for Covid relief and an amount of Rs. 50,000/ was donated to the PM Cares Fund on in May 2020.
